Fall is here and time for winter salt and sands to be stored. Lee has been working on storage. Hopefully we won't need as much as in the past. We have finished the inventory of the roads and will get the program to enter the data for a better priority of road needs. The Bartlett Road (Crank Road) had a major culvert collapse which was quickly fixed by Lee. Lee has also redone part of the Cottle Hill Road with fabric which should be stable for a fair amount of time. North Road and Belgrade Road have been repaved. The library is in full donation mode to expand the library and provide a better place for all of us. George Smith is heading up the fundraising, please give as much as you can for this worthwhile cause for Mount Vernon/Vienna.

We are hosting a Homework Help workshop for parents on Saturday, November 7<sup>th</sup>, at 4 p.m. Linda Smith and Alice Olson (both retired teachers) will lead the informal discussion. 

## Brief Health Officer Updates: Flu, Volunteers Driving Miss Daisy, and Senior Housing

### Flu

Influenza is already in Maine; as of October 10, there had been 5 confirmed cases, including 2 in Franklin Co, and 1 in Kennebec! This is early and serious. I've always urged people to hold off getting immunized, as we need to do every year, until at least November, but this year I'm wrong. If you haven't already had your shot, do it now.

Influenza is an upper (runny nose/sore throat) and lower respiratory (pneumonias) tract viral infection. It infects the cells lining the respiratory tract and lungs, and spreads from person to person by respiratory droplets transmitted by coughing and sneezing. Infections usually peak in February-March in the Northern hemisphere when we spend more time in-doors with other people at school and work. It is not a gastro-intestinal infection, although we colloquially say someone with vomiting and diarrhea has "flu" as well; they are not the same infections. The influenza virus takes 2-4 days to cause illness after a person is exposed. The first symptoms are usually severe sore throat and/or cough, with fever and chills developing over the subsequent 24 hours. The fever lasts 2-4 days, but the patient continues to cough and doesn't really feel normal for at least a week or two.

There are some rare but bad complications that can appear and even be fatal. A very small percentage of healthy adults, who get influenza, can develop an overwhelming viral pneumonia and die quickly. Thus, if someone with cough and fever over 101° gets badly short of breath, they need medical attention fast. The other complication, seen more often in young children and people over 60, is a secondary bacterial pneumonia. The story there is usually of a febrile illness over 2-3 days that gets better but then the fever comes back and the patient is much sicker. These patients need antibiotics to stop the bacterial infection. However, for the vast majority of infected people, the treatment is just aspirin (adults) or acetaminophen/ibuprofen (children) along with fluids, plus tincture of time.

Influenza changes its stripes (surface protein antigens) nearly every year, thereby being able to re-infect people who have antibodies to it from flu infections in previous years. In adults, the vaccine is given in the arm or leg muscle (intramuscularly), or less effectively, beneath the skin, (subcutaneously). It is a killed vaccine, meaning there are no live virus particles in it, only dead viral cells and bits (surface antigens). Those bits induce your body to make circulating influenza virus bullets (antibodies) over the 2-3 weeks after the shot, so viruses entering your body thereafter are mowed down in large numbers, though not 100%. A few survive and may still cause illness, albeit milder.

The best way to treat this common disease is to boost your immunity with a flu shot, so you don't catch it or get only a mild case. The vaccine is reformulated each year, usually with 2 influenza type A variants and one or two type B by the US Centers for Disease Control (CDC). The CDC bases what they tell manufacturers to put in the vaccine on their best guess of which sub-type variants are around and most infectious. The vaccine is egg-based, so the rare person who is truly egg protein allergic (I've never met one), can't take the shot and must use alternatives. Most of us do fine, suffering at most a mildly sore arm. Many claim to have "gotten the flu from the shot," but this is not possible. Most, I think, are describing a brief aching from the body's healing the injection site and/or a concomitant cold.

Adults and children over 8 need only one dose each year. Children over 6 months and under 8 need a series of 2 shots (or nasal drops if over age 2) at least a month apart, if they have never had a flu shot before or have been 2 or more years without one. No immunizations for kids under 6 months; they will have some immunity from their mother still on board, from placental transfer; hopefully the family members who hug them all get their flu shots.

The vaccines do work but certainly don't always prevent infection; in fact you still have a 75% chance of getting influenza, if exposed, even though you've had a flu shot. But your chances of being so sick you can't work are reduced to only 60% of what they would have been if you hadn't had the shot, because the shot moderates the symptoms. It prevents the most deaths in the elderly, the young, and the chronically ill (asthma, emphysema, and diabetes) because those groups get much sicker without the shot.

Flu shots are often cheapest at doctors' offices, special clinics, some pharmacies and elsewhere, \$7-\$20. So get one!

### Neighbors Driving Neighbors

The volunteer transportation program for Mt Vernon and Vienna, along with Fayette, Rome, and Belgrade residents, Neighbors Driving Neighbors, starts in mid November. The plan is to provide transportation for those in our community who can't drive, to Farmington or Augusta/Waterville, or within our communities and thereby allow them to remain in our communities and not have to move away when they no longer can drive safely. We've lost too many already over the past year. The program needs volunteer drivers to "drive Miss Daisy", and charitable donations, as well as riders. An initial orientation for drivers occurred October 27; rides should start a week or two thereafter. ### Senior Housing Initiatives

Finally, along the same line as the driving project to assure seniors' ability to age in place in these towns they've lived in for decades, read about Bond issue question #2 on the November ballot. It would support rehabbing individual seniors' houses as well as fund affordable senior housing throughout the state. If it is passed, I'd like to work on getting our communities involved in both approaches. It is so painful to see so many of our aging citizens lost to us and us to them by moves to boarding homes elsewhere.


